<sup>1</sup> Some park populations of gray wolf, roseate tern, piping plover, coho salmon, Chinook salmon, steelhead, and green sea turtle are listed as endangered while other park populations are listed as threatened. In order not to double count them, these seven species are counted under the endangered category.

<sup>2</sup> Twenty-three species present in park units have experimental status in addition to endangered or threatened status. These species are counted under the endangered or threatened category.

<sup>3</sup> Plants include conifers, cycads, flowering plants, lichens, ferns, and fern allies.

<sup>4</sup> Invertebrates include corals, crustaceans, clams, and snails.
